Law enforcement or DHR may set up the forensic interview, but the CAC will e-mail all parties to confirm the interview date and time. The CAC will take down the child's basic information including: name, date of birth, guardian's name and contact information, nature of allegation, and any law enforcement/DHR investigators involved. The CAC will send out interview confirmation to both DHR and the law enforcement officer on the case. 4. The CAC will conduct the interview as scheduled, with consent of the guardian, and will provide law enforcement with a copy of the recorded interview. The CAC will also provide DHR and law enforcement with a written interview report with 72 hours unless it is a holiday or extenuating circumstances. It is requested that in depth questioning or scheduling of an outside trauma assessment not be utilized until AFTER the forensic interview has been completed so as not to taint the recorded interview. 5. The CAC will be staffed at monthly MDT meetings until a conclusion has been reached. In the case that the CAC is contacted to perform an ACUTE medical exam (that would be a rape kit), the CAC would immediately ask that DHR be notified (if not already) and a police report be made. An ACUTE exam can NOT take place without law enforcement there to collect the evidence

They learn the importance of protecting their rights, discover ways to resolve their problems, discover safe ways to respond to teasing and bullying and learn when to ask an adult for help. 1st Grade/ Stop Picking on Me - Children learn how to express their feelings about teasing in a safe way in different situations. They also learn how to ask an adult for help with teasing and bullying problems. Body Safety/ Body Boundaries is discussed. 2nd Grade/ Don't Call Me Names - Similar to the 1st grade program, the children are reminded about how to stand up for themselves and their friends in hurtful situations. They also discuss how to ask for help from trusted adults. Body Safety/ Body Boundaries is discussed. 3rd Grade/ It's OK to Say NO - Children learn how to stand up to peer pressure when asked to do something that they do not want to do or feel that they should not do. They learn to tell how they feel, how to walk away or how to change their minds if they feel that they should say "NO" in certain situations. Body Safety/ Body Boundaries is discussed. 4th Grade/ Harassment Hurts: Gossiping, Taunting and Bullying - Students are asked to think about who they could turn to if they are bullied and how to stand up to children who bully their friends. They discuss how to make wise choices and decisions. Body Safety/ Body Boundaries is discussed. 5th Grade/ Dealing with Abuse: If It Happens to You - This program presents the realities of child abuse from a child's perspective, including the guilt and responsibility a victim may feel, and the difficulty a victim may have in reporting an incident of abuse. Physical, emotional and sexual abuse scenarios are on the video, not to make students feel uncomfortable, but to openly discuss how they can stay safe and identify steps they can take to protect themselves. 6th Grade/ Protecting Your

During her senior year in high school, Erin began her crusade to end the silence and shame around sexual abuse. The intent around Erin's Law is to shatter the silence and stigma around child sexual abuse. Erin's Law requires that all public schools in each state implement a prevention-oriented child sexual abuse program which teaches: Students in pre-K through twelfth grade, age-appropriate techniques to recognize child sexual abuse and tell a trusted adult. d. When a child abuse report is made involving school personnel, the report is referred to local law enforcement for investigation.
School administrators, superintendents and principals will receive written notification
of the disposition of the investigation of these

personnel as parents and their own children, these reports are investigated by DHR.
 e. DHR has the responsibility to conduct timely assessments into reports of Child Abuse/Neglect/Exploitation and to give timely feedback
