AltaPointe provides services in Coosa County (School based therapy, Care Coordination) and residents in Coosa County can go to Sylacauga Outpatient to receive outpatient mental health services. Care Coordinators can assist children/adolescents and families and link them to additional resources that are available in their county and neighboring counties. Care coordinators can provide limited transportation to assist children/adolescents/ adults in getting access to resources such as outpatient therapy, medication management and assessment by the CRNP. When school is in session, children/adolescents have access to a school-based therapy for Individual, Family Therapy and Crisis intervention. School based therapists work with the schools to identify child/adolescents and coordinate care for those that may need services. AltaPointe is available to set up for community events and provide professional development for teachers/staff at the school system and other community agencies. During community events, AltaPointe provides information to the community about the services that are available to them and how to access those services.

Describe the greatest mental health needs in your county.*

Coosa county continues to experience issues with transportation, lack of financial resources, lack of education regarding what resources are available to residents regarding accessing mental health care. A huge issue is the lack of parental involvement in accessing and utilizing resources for children/adolescents, this could be due to stigma, lack of information, lack of transportation, lack of financial resources. Coosa county could benefit from a community resource center to assist children, adolescents and families, adults, and the elderly population to have the ease of access to information. The community resource center could assist with parental workshops and incentives to assist parents to utilize resources that are available to them in the community.

Coosa county's juvenile court liaison evaluate/assesses and provides therapy for the mental and emotional needs of children/adolescence referred by the juvenile court and referrals are also made for children outside of the juvenile court. The JCL makes clinical recommendations to the courts and collaborates with referral sources such as the school system, DHR and the Right Step Program with Chloe Butler. Miss Butler provides children referred to her by the court or the school, assistance, counseling with issues that are identified as struggles such as drug, alcohol, bullying, peer pressure and parent child conflict she can also make referrals for residential placement for adolescents who need inpatient residential treatment referred from the school or parents or the juvenile probation officer in lieu of being committed to the Department of Youth Services by juvenile court for alcohol and or drug related issues.
