As of 2020, 46.50% of people in poverty have presented barriers and challenges for parents to access health care, substance abuse, and mental health treatment. This directly correlates to the increase in domestic violence and child abuse reports.

Youth in DeKalb County needing inpatient beds due to a mental health crisis must be hospitalized in a local hospital and wait on an inpatient bed out of the county. The DeKalb Youth Service Center partners with The University of Alabama Betty Shirley Clinic to provide psychiatric evaluations for youths. DYSC also partners with Dr. Samuel Fleming to provide psychological assessments to youth.

DeKalb County Adoption percentages and the number of children reunited with their parents or placed with other family members through the Kinshare Program are higher than the state average.

Problem(3) Substance Abuse: The DCBOE has approved having vape sensors installed in the youth restrooms at the DeKalb County Board of Education. This installation is scheduled to start in the Summer of 2023 and be completed before the students return for the 2023-2024 school year. This will further serve as a security and front-line intervention in substance abuse prevention and intervention. DeKalb Youth Service Center Administrative Staff are alerted if a vape device or other smoking product is used.
