The I.M.P.A.C.T (Influence, Motivate, Purpose, Action, Commitment, Trust) Mentoring program is a program designed to build the character of youth ages 11-17 in the Atmore area. This program provides mentors and resources that enable participants to reach their maximum potential within their schools and communities. Some of the resources are: the After-School Youth Drop Off Center, After-School Tutoring Program, and the Mentoring Program. This program mission is to expose youth within the Atmore area to positive experiences to enhance our youth chances to succeed in their schools and community.

Who benefitted from Accomplishment 4?

The IMPACT Program provided a Youth Drop-In Center that was open Monday-Thursday from 3:30pm-6:00pm. This center provided a safe location for youth to engage in health alternatives to high risk behaviors. Approximately, 50 students were served during the school year.

Accomplishment 5

Project Turn Around Diversion Program is a program that provides community level resources to help rehabilitate juvenile offenders who would have otherwise be sent to the Department of Youth Services. Each participant has an individualized service plan crafted to their unique needs. Through community partnerships the program was able to keep 28 youth at home with their families, in their school and in the community. Services included supervision, counseling services and educational support to enhance school success. Additional, resources were available to both the student and his/her families as needed.
