We have a Family Drug Court in St. Clair County which is designed to address the entire family and the effects of substance abuse. Teens who have a similar problem due to family issues are included in the meetings. The recidivisim rate is 30 - 35%. Family Drug Court has been helping St. Clair County families for 8 years.

Credit Recovery and Graduation Assistance*

Describe programs in your county designed specifically to prevent dropping out of high school or to encourage reenrollment.

St. Clair County Schools use Edgenuity, an online learning platform that encourages students to make up credits during the year.

Several businesses and industries in St. Clair County offer "real time" training, during the school day. The students are encouraged to stay in school, graduate and get a job where they trained.

Pell City Schools have a PST (Problem Solving Team) to prevent dropouts. This group of leaders looks at students who are struggling acadeically, behaviorally, and with attendance to find the best inventions/supports that the students need.

The high school has implemented a "Just One" approach where every faculty member develops a relationship with a student who is struggling. The staff will check in on the student and encourage them through their time at PCHS. The Career Coach works with College and Career Readiness which prepares students for what they will do after high school.

The school system has contracted with Whole Child Coaches (elementary, middle and high school) to assist in reaching out to families of students who are having issues.
