Credit Recovery and Graduation Assistance*

Describe programs in your county designed specifically to prevent dropping out of high school or to encourage reenrollment.

We handle this in a few ways, mainly by trying to catch up students that have failed a class in the very next semester using Ed-Genuity in the X block time slot that is built into the high school schedule. Students that don't need to catch up can use that as enrichment or for clubs, etc. This is not intended to be a time block to earn credit, but it is for catch up.

We are still offering summer school classes where students can make up two classes.

Additionally, our requirement of 28 graduation credits, which is higher than surrounding schools, still has the possibility of students graduating mid-year, as a senior, which means that you have an entire semester to make up anything that may still be lacking.

We don't actually encourage re-enrollment, because we try not to prevent dropouts through credit monitoring and career choice placement starting in 8th grade.

Our withdrawal procedure requires an exit interview which is intended to help prevent dropping out through a series of questions trying to get to the basis of the reason for the withdrawal.

Discipline problems in schools*

There are numerous issues which cause suspension, but this year there were several for fighting (mostly because it involves more than one person, though everyone involved can be suspended at least for a few days). There are many issues with threats to other students, the school or directed at a teacher. Many students were suspended for possession/use of substances prohibited at school. The shorter-term suspensions are probably more related to disrespect/defiance where students refuse to comply with directions in a manner that keeps other students from learning. Those issues seem to be mostly related to a lack of respect for authority/teaching or others (other student learning), because it is probably impossible to keep each student fully engaged 100% of the classroom time and during transitions. Progressive discipline (maybe not the correct term) utilized in the classroom has reduced suspensions but requires an increased tolerance to disruption by the general population of students.
