According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, there are many risk factors that contribute to victimization. Among those factors, two listed are substance abuse and mental health. Both of those factors are priorities that we have identified from our county as the top two needs in our Needs Assessment. We have many caregivers struggling with substance abuse which is impacts their ability to provide appropriate care to the children in their home, as well as many youth who are also struggling with substance abuse. We also have limited resources for mental health services for both adults and youth. Lauderdale County has 0 inpatient beds available for any age group. Due to the lack of resources and the demand for these resources, domestic violence and child abuse will likely continue to stay the same or increase.
